Class 73 Oakley's Best Allotment -All Oakley allotments (at rear of Oakley Village Hall) will be judged (unless the owner opts out) - no entry fee this year for this class! Please ensure your plot number is clearly displayed

### Criteria used by judges

# **CAKES WITHOUT EGGS**

Quoted from the Stork Margarine Cookery Service, "The Art of Home Cooking" 1954

"For perfect results in cake making, eggs are essential, but when these are scarce or expensive, it is still possible to make very good cakes, if these Stork recipes are used, for Stork Margarine gives an all-important, rich flavour of its own."

### **Black Treacle Cake**

INGREDIENTS	METHOD
8oz plain flour ½ level tsp salt ½ level tsp cinnamon 1 heaped tsp mixed spice ⅓ tsp bicarbonate of soda	Sieve all together into a mixing bowl
4oz Stork margarine	Cut into ½ inch squares and rub in
2oz sugar	Add to the rubbed-in mixture and stir together
3 level tbs black treacle 2 level tbs golden syrup	Warm slightly together in a saucepan, allow to cool a little and pour onto the rubbed-in mixture
6 tbs fresh milk	Add to the mixture and stir thoroughly together, beating well
Put into prepared tin and smooth e	venly
Baking: Shelf- Middle Temperature	- Moderate, (Mark 4; 360F, 180 C)

6" tin	-	15cm	
2oz	-	50g	
4oz	-	100g	(of course any hard margarine may be used!)
8oz	-	225g



## What is a Twiddlemuff?

It is a knitted muff with items attached so that someone with dementia can twiddle in their hands. People with dementia often have restless hands and like to have something to keep their hands occupied. A Twiddlemuff provides a wonderful source of visual, tactile and sensory stimulation and at the same time keeps hands snug and warm.

### Pattern for a knitted Twiddlemuff

- Materials: This muff pattern is perfect for using up left over and odd balls of wool.
- **Needles:** 8mm circular or 6.5mm straight needles.
- **Cuff:** Cast on 45 stitches using 2 strands of double knitting wool or 1 strand of chunky wool (one plain colour works best). Work in stocking stitch for 28cm (11 inches).
- **Muff Body:** Continue with stocking stitch, but use up oddments of various textures of wool such as chunky, mohair, ribbon etc. until the work measures 58cm (23 inches) (two strands of double knit for two rows each gives a lovely assortment of colours). Cast off.
- **Finishing:** If working with straight needles, lightly iron the long strip, then neatly join the sides together using edge to edge stitch (with the knit side facing out). Turn inside out and push the one-colour cuff up inside the muff body. Sew the two ends together, again using a neat edge to edge stitch.
- **Decoration:** Now is the time if you want to decorate the muff, inside and out, with ribbons, beads, flowers, zips, loops, pompoms, buttons, etc. Knit a separate pocket for a favourite photo or a hanky. Be creative, but make sure each item is securely attached.
